Dear lovers in Christ,

Some tid-bits gleaned from the files of *Google*:

The feast of St. Valentine of February 14 was first established in 496 by Pope Gelasius I, who included Valentine among all those "... whose names are justly reverenced among men, but whose acts are known only to God." As Gelasius implies, nothing was then known about his [St. Valentine's] life.

In the French 14th-century manuscript illumination from a Vies des Saints, Saint Valentine, bishop of Terni, oversees the construction of his basilica at Terni; there is no suggestion here that the bishop was a patron of lovers.

During the Middle Ages, it was believed that birds paired in mid-February. This was then associated with the romance of Valentine. Although these legends differ, Valentine's Day is widely recognized as a day for romance and devotion.

Historians trace the origin of Valentine's Day to ancient Roman Empire. It is said

that in the Rome of ancient times people observed a holiday on February 14th to honor Juno - the Queen of Roman Gods and Goddesses. On the following day, February 15th began the fertility festival called 'Feast of

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Lupercalia'. The festival of Lupercalia was celebrated to honor the gods Lupercus and Faunus - the Roman god of Agriculture besides the legendary founders of Rome, Romulus and Remus.

Isn't it funny how traditions get established? Though Valentine's Day is celebrated throughout the world, no one seems to put as much into this day as Americans do. Whether that is the influence of the Hallmark Company, [In the United States, about 190 million Valentine's Day cards are sent each year, not including the hundreds of millions of cards school children exchange] or just our ingrained desire for love and romance is anyone's guess.

What it does bring to my attention is that we all desire to be loved. No matter what age, what background, what nationality or whatever else might be said to distinguish "us" from "them", we all have this inherent need to be loved.

I find it confusing and audacious that in a time where we have a generation (the "Millennials") who claim to be the "most connected generation in the world", we find ourselves to be suffering from an epidemic of loneliness. The more we connect with one another and find each other reachable at any time of the day or night, the more we find ourselves unfulfilled and alone. Not only is that a shame,

Maybe we should be celebrating Valentine's Day more... Not just for lovers intent on spending their lives together, but for all of us in Christian love. After all, we read in Matthew 22 Jesus saying, "³⁷ He said to him, "'You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind.' ³⁸ This is the greatest and first commandment. ³⁹ And a second is like it: 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself.' ⁴⁰ On these two commandments hang all the law and the prophets."

February 14th is as good a place to start as any, but let us all dedicate ourselves to loving each other as God would have us do!



Bob will use his many years of experience as a scientist who has closely followed the problem of climate change to present information on the following: causes of global warming; impacts of global warming in Wisconsin and in the U.S.; consensus in the scientific community; what is needed to create positive change; and, taking responsibility as people of faith.

Bob will also share resources from the Care for God's Creation team that include materials from ELCA World Hunger, ELCA Advocacy, and additional faith-based and secular groups.

As residents of this beautiful piece of God's creation, we know there are many valuable natural resources, a rich history and interesting cultural heritage that make our home unique. These assets also produce an interesting opportunity.



Chili peppers boost income for farmers in Indonesia

On a half-acre on the island of Nias. Indonesia, that belonged to his father, Yaatulo and his wife, Mariata, grow bananas to support themselves and their two children.

While they work hard, the income from the bananas wasn't enough to support the family, Yaatulo says. Bananas are only harvested once a year, bringing the family an income equivalent to about \$40 USD a month.

One day while working, Yaatulo heard about a development program of the Center for Disaster Risk Management & Community Development Studies, which is supported by gifts to ELCA World Hunger. He decided to join, and soon he had the support to borrow enough money for chili seeds. Over two months, Yaatulo and Mariata cleared their land and dug trenches to plant more than 1,000 chili bushes.

Chilis can be harvested multiple times a year and grow relatively quickly, giving farmers more opportunities to sell them at markets. One kilogram can sell for \$3 USD, so over three months the crop has the



potential to add up to \$200 USD in revenue. Now, Yaatulo and Mariata have diversified their income sources.

"I will pay [the loan] back in three months so that someone else can use the money," Yaatulo says.

Through ELCA World Hunger, this church accompanies our neighbors like Yaatulo around the world as they work to end hunger and poverty. Thanks to your gifts to ELCA World Hunger, farmers like Yaatulo have improved access to the tools, training, livestock, seeds and more that will help their families increase farm production and have more to eat and sell on the market.

Yaatulo and Mariata have become an inspiration for others in their community and have helped their neighbors start their own farms. "We are listening and learning," he says. "I feel very happy."




