Brothers and sisters in Christ, warm greetings and Happy New Year to all!

"Pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstance so for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you." (1 Thessalonians 5:17-18)

Luther writes about the command and promises, "You should say, 'My prayer is as precious, holy, and pleasing to God as that of St. Paul or of the most holy saints. This is the reason: I will gladly grant that Paul is personally more holy, but that's not because of the commandment. God does not consider prayer because of the person, but because of His Word and obedience to it. For I rest my prayer on the same commandment on which all the saints rest their prayer. Furthermore, I pray for the same thing that they all pray for and always have prayed. Besides, I have just as great a need of what I pray for as those great saints; no, even a greater one than

they."

So, in fact, Martin taught us to pray each morning, "I thank you, my Heavenly Father, through Jesus Christ, your dear Son, that you have kept me this night from all harm and danger; and I pray that you would keep me this day also from sin and every evil, that all my doings and life may please you. For into your hands I commend myself, my body and soul, and all things. Let your holy angel be with me, that the evil foe may have no power over me. Amen." Each and every day was a new chance...a new beginning...a clean slate on which to once again give glory to God and to try again to live as God's servant.

So this new beginning of a brand new year *is* exciting! It is another chance at living a life that would please our God, and bring us closer to models of the godly life. Doesn't it feel good to wash away the dirt of 2018 that has accumulated and weighed us down? Now we get to start again, renewed, refreshed, and reminded once again that Jesus is coming!

Meeting was called to order at 7:00 PM by President Peter Antonie

Attendance: All Present

We wish as a Council to give special recognition and a HUGE THANK YOU to Liz Herrling who organized this years Church Christmas Program presented on Dec 16th. The Children and Youth portion was well done and warmly received. The rest of the Christmas Service was also exceptional with a Thank You to all the participants who provided Special Music and Talent to the Service!

Treasurer's Report: To be approved as part of the Spending Plan discussion

<u>Vision and Mission:</u> Expectations have been discussed for Youth, Participation and Visibility Teams for 2019. Going forward in the New Year with Cabin fever Relievers, Youth activities and Pictorial and Time and Talent being completed.

Old Business:

Pastor Barry's Expectations and Evaluation has been completed and presented for signing Liz H, Administrative Assistant Evaluation has been completed and presented for signing

2019 Council & Committee representatives – Carol Johnson to replace Missy Danz who has served Faithfully for 6 years. A huge Thank You to Missy for all the good work she has done on the Council and her and her family have done in the Community! Peter A stated that he would be willing to continue to serve as a Council member to help oversee the continuity of the future of VL in a non presidential position.

Finalize Spending Plan – Steve H presented a recap of previous yrs., (2015-17) when we did not meet our budgeted contributions but our expenses also did not meet projections. In 2018 our contributions are lagging but our expenses are meeting projections which is causing a shortfall of dollars. The first step in attempting to balance the Spending Plan is the current call to the Congregation for additional contributions beyond their regular giving.

The next step is a serious look at our Mission Contributions for 2019. We are anticipating diverting a large portion of this income such as The Lutefisk Dinner towards our operational expenses in 2019. With this diversion of Mission Expense to income we are budgeting \$15,000 less on our expense side. 2019 will be a pivotal year for Vermont as we attempt to balance our Spending Plan. These changes currently are for one year and results will be evaluated in 2019.

Spending Plan will be presented at the Annual Meeting for discussion.

Aaron T. made a motion to approve the Treasurer's Report and the 2019 Spending plan, Paul D. seconded, approved unanimously.

Annual Meeting: date set for January 27, 2019 following the Worship Service in the Fellowship Hall

Online Giving: ELCA has a Credit Union that has a plan available for Church Members who wish to do online giving. This plan will be explored further and if it appears feasible will be presented to the Congregation.

Weaving a new fabric of home

When conflict broke out in Darfur, Sudan, in the early 2000s, Souad, her parents and 11 siblings were forced to flee.

After 13 years living in a refugee camp in Chad, Souad and her family moved to Tucson, Ariz. It wasn't long before Souad's father took her and her siblings to the Iskashitaa Refugee Network (IRN), where the whole family began volunteering.

IRN is an intergenerational network of Tucson volunteers and refugees from Africa, Asia and the Middle East that harvests and redistributes locally grown fruits and vegetables that would otherwise go to waste. The group's work is supported in part by your gifts to ELCA World Hunger.

IRN founder and director Barbara Eiswerth calls the program a "multicultural exchange" that's unique in its format. The network addresses several needs at once: reducing food waste, breaking down barriers between



people and helping refugees resettle.

In addition to taking home food that has been gleaned, refugees are also connected with other services through the network. At food preservation workshops, participants can practice their English skills and share recipes and techniques from their home countries. It's a perfect example of ELCA World Hunger's integrated philosophy in action integrating food security, agriculture, education and more.

"It's not going to be home, but we can help refugees weave a new fabric of a new home," Eiswerth says.

Today, Souad is 27, and while she works most weekdays, she still spends her Saturdays volunteering, picking and sorting produce. To her, volunteering is part of the fabric of her life.




"For we are His workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand that we should walk in them." (Ephesians 2:10).
